Mercer is coming off a tough loss to Savannah State on Tuesday at Claude Smith Field. The Tigers scored the first seven runs of the game while the Bears' offense sputtered. They put only three runners in scoring position the entire contest and recorded their three extra-base hits in the final two frames. Tyler Brown belted his second home run in four games and Matt Crawford went 3-for-4 with a pair of RBIs, but those were about the only bright spots for the Bears' offense. Five pitchers combined to give up eight runs, seven of which were earned, on 12 hits and three walks while striking out eight. The staff gave up hits at crucial times as Savannah State garnered one home run and a bases-loaded, three-run double in the affair. In all the Tigers notched six extra-base hits and was able to string together a number of successful rallies.

Craig Gibson Head Coach - Fourth Season



Mercer head coach Craig Gibson has helped put the Bears among the elite squads in the Atlantic Sun Conference heading into 2007. Last season, Gibson led Mercer to its best finish since 1999, earning a 34-26 mark and a third-place finish in the conference. Highlighting the season were victories over No. 1 Florida and No. 1 Clemson. Closer Andrew Urena finished second in the nation in saves with 15, and earned All-America honors from several publications. Urena was chosen by the Chicago White Sox during the 11th round of the June major league baseball draft. Brantley New was also drafted last June in the 27th round by the Boston Red Sox, but elected to return to Mercer for his senior year. The Bears also finished over .500 in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 1982-83. Due to the recent success, Gibson has been able to land top-flight recruits, as *Collegiate Baseball* tabbed Mercer's 2007 recruiting class among the nation's top tier.

In 2005, Gibson guided the Bears back above .500, marking the first time Mercer had finished the season with a winning record since 1999. In the process, the Bears set a new school record with eight shutouts and defeated Southwest Missouri State, who finished the season ranked in the Top 25.

Gibson became the third head coach at Mercer University since 1948 at the start of the 2004 season. Barry Myers hung up his spikes after 26 years at Mercer and the Bears did not have to go far to find their new leader.

In his first campaign as head coach, Gibson led his young

squad to a 20-35 record, a nine-win improvement from the previous season. The 2004 Bears had just three seniors on the roster, and of the eight juniors on the squad, only one had played for Mercer in 2003. The rest of the junior class had transferred to Mercer looking for a chance to win.

Mercer opened the 2004 season with a victory over Florida A&M for Gibson's first career win on January 24, 2004. On March 20, 2004, the Bears defeated Jacksonville 2-0, for Gibson's first Atlantic Sun Conference victory. The Bears won two of three games against Troy on April 23-24, 2004 for the first conference series win during the Craig Gibson Era.

Gibson started his career at Mercer as a player. His junior year, the hard-hitting first baseman earned Atlantic Sun Conference Player of the Year honors, while leading the Bears to the Atlantic Sun Tournament and a second-place finish in the regular season.

Following his playing career, Gibson served as a graduate assistant coach on Myers' staff. He then took over as the head baseball coach at Jupiter Community High School in Jupiter, Fla., for two years before moving over to Suncoast Community High School in Riviera Beach, Fla., for one season. Gibson wrapped up his high school coaching career in 1993 as the head coach at Palm Beach Gardens High School in Palm Beach, Fla.

In August 1993, Gibson got the call to come home and serve as an assistant under Myers. With his strong ties to Mercer and a wealth of coaching experience, it made Athletics Director Bobby Pope's choice an easy one when he elevated Gibson to the head job following Myers resignation.

During his time as an assistant, Gibson coached four players who were drafted by the Major Leagues and helped lead Mercer to two A-Sun divisional titles. The Bears also advanced to the A-Sun Tournament three times, finishing as high as third in 1999. The 1999 team was one of the best Gibson worked with, finishing in a tie for third place in the A-Sun at 19-11 and going 36-24 overall.

Since 1994, he has also been involved in helping fundraising for Mercer athletics, serving as director of the athletic department annual fund.

On top of his victories on the field, Gibson was a winner in the classroom, earning a bachelor's degree in history and health, physical education and recreation, and a master's of education in social science from Mercer.

A native of Macon, Ga., Gibson and his wife Diane have two children, Tyler and Lindsey.

A Look at the Owls

Kennesaw State (24-18, 6-9 A-Sun) has been up-and-down all season long as they have not won more than four games in a row, but have not lost more than three consecutive contests. The Owls have yet to face a nationally-ranked opponent this season, and KSU and Mercer have competed against eight common opponents. Kennesaw State lost two of three versus Western Carolina while the Bears took a single game from the Catamounts, KSU defeated Georgia Southern twice and the Bears downed the Eagles in their only meeting, each squad won two of three against Samford and Jacksonville, the Owls up-ended Georgia and Savannah State in single games while Mercer fell to UGA twice and SSU once, KSU lost three games to Stetson and swept a three-game set against UNF while Mercer took two of three at the Ospreys and lost its series with the Hatters.

Offensively, the Owls are ranked third in the league in hitting and are led by Jacob Robbins and Martin Baker who own the top two batting averages in the A-Sun at .393 and .387, respectively. Baker leads the conference in on-base percentage (.502), is tied for first with 46 runs scored, third in hits (63), tied for fourth in walks (27) and tied for second in stolen bases with 19. Robbins is second in on-base percentage at a .488 clip, tied for sixth in walks (26) and also has 19 stolen bases, to tie Baker for second position. The Owls have had two players named Atlantic Sun Player of the Week, Adam Cross on Feb. 26 and Clint Roques on Apr. 16.

On the mound, KSU ranks second in the A-Sun in pitching led by Dan Dale and Kyle Heckathorn. Dale sports a 3.00 ERA good for fourth in the conference and is ninth in opposing batting average (.244). Heckathorn anchors the leading strikeout staff in the A-Sun with 73 (T2nd) and is eighth in ERA (3.39) and seventh in opposing batting average (.226).

Mike Sansing is in his 16th season at the helm of the KSU program. Heading into this season he sported a record of 632-258 with the Owls and 199-160 overall in 18 seasons.

The last time the two teams met was last season in Kennesaw. The Owls took the opener 8-7 and the finale 10-6, but the Bears took the second game, 10-3.

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - The Mercer baseball squad opened its 2007 campaign with a bang, scoring two runs in the ninth inning to grab a 6-5 decision over No. 2 Miami on Friday night. Claude Smith Field

MACON, Ga. - The Bears gave the Bulldogs all they could handle Wednesday night at Claude Smith Field, but were defeated 6-5 in front of a standing-room only crowd. The Georgia bullpen held Mercer in check over the final five innings, allowing only one unearned run, and stranding seven runners on base.

Mercer (4-6) received a big lift as right-hander Boone Webster escaped a jam in the first inning. With the bases loaded and two outs, Webster struck out Ryan Peisel to end the inning.

A wild second inning began when Georgia (1-3) notched four consecutive hits with one out to take a 3-0 lead. Matt Cerione delivered a RBI-double and Gordon Beckham scored two more runs on his double down the left-field line.

The Bears came right back as Eric Renfroe got things going with a one-out double and Jason Lowey

followed with a walk. Billy Shaughnessy came through with a big two-run single and he scored on an error by right fielder Cerione to tie the game at three. Dortch drove a single to the opposite-field and Shaughnessy was held by head coach Craig Gibson at third, but Cerione attempted to throw behind the runner and air-mailed the ball to the fence, allowing Shaughnessy to cross the plate.

The 'Dogs took the lead for good in the top of the fourth, as Beckham picked up another run batted in with a single to left field and Jonathan Wyatt followed with a run-scoring single.

Mercer would not go quietly tacking on a run in its half of the fourth, making the score 5-4. Shaughnessy once again was clutch notching a lead-off double. The Bears played small ball as Shaughnessy advanced to third on a sacrifice bunt and scored on Dortch's second hit of the night.

Georgia added some insurance an inning later when Mike Freeman registered the game-winning RBI on a double down the left-field line.

In the eighth inning, the Bears pulled to within one at 6-5. Shaughnessy scored his third run of the game on a heads-up play. Mike Armstrong hit a routine grounder to the shortstop, but Beckham was unable to make the play. While first baseman Ryan Peisel was trying to gather the ball, Shaughnessy alertly took off from third and dove around catcher Joey Lewis's tag.

Matt Crawford kept the game alive for Mercer, recording a bunt single with two outs in the final frame. Lowey followed with a walk, but Georgia's hard-throwing closer Josh Fields notched his third strikeout of the inning to pick up his first save of the season.

Webster (2-1) went 4.0 innings and allowed five earned runs on 11 hits. He struck out one and walked five batters. Nick Montgomery (1-0) picked up starter Dean Weaver and threw 3.0 innings of no-run, one-hit ball. Montgomery fanned three and walked one.

Shaughnessy led the Bears at the plate as he went 2-for-4 with two RBIs to go along with his three runs scored. Dortch finished the game 2-for-4 with one RBI and Steve Karwatt was 2-for-4 with a double to deep-center field in the seventh inning.

"We gave it our best shot and played well," said Gibson. "We need to get more two-out hits against a team of Georgia's caliber. This game should help us down the road when we get into our conference schedule."

DiMauro laced a one-out double into the gap in left-center field and Dortch crossed the plate giving Mercer the win.

Right hander Brantley New picked up a no-decision in his fourth start of the season. He allowed one earned run on six hits in 6.0 innings of work. New struck out eight batters and walked one.
